### **ERASMUS for ALL**

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#### WHAT is ERASMUS for ALL?

Erasmus for All is the new EU programme for education, training, youth and sport for the period 2014-2020, proposed by the European Commission on 23 November 2011.

The proposal is now under discussion by the Council (27 Member States) and the European Parliament who will take the final decision.







# How will Erasmus for All differ from the current programmes?

- Erasmus for All would replace seven existing programmes with one: it brings together the existing Lifelong Learning Programme (Erasmus, Leonardo da Vinci, Comenius and Grundtvig), Youth in Action, and five international cooperation programmes (Erasmus Mundus, Tempus, Alfa, Edulink and the programme for cooperation with industrialised countries
- The Programme will reduce the number of activities supported in the 2007-2013 programmes from 75 to 11, e.g., the Lifelong Learning Programme has six subprogrammes, more than 50 objectives and over 60 actions







### Why do we need a new EU approach to education and training?

- The world was different when the existing programmes were created
- The European job market is also changing
- The Europe 2020 strategy







### Who will be the main beneficiaries?

Erasmus for All is open to all learners and trainers, through any public or private body active in education, training, youth and sport. It will support formal and non-formal learning experiences and activities across all sectors







#### What will Erasmus for All support?

The programme will support three main types of actions:


- 1. Learning mobility for individuals
- Cooperation for innovation and good practices
- 3. Support for policy reform







#### Learning mobility for individuals









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
- Staff mobility, in particular for teachers, trainers, school leaders and youth workers.
- Mobility for higher education students (including joint/double degrees) and vocational education and training students.
- Erasmus Master for master degree mobility of higher education students, through a new loan guarantee mechanism.
- Youth mobility, including volunteering and youth exchanges.

### Cooperation for innovation and good practices


- Strategic partnerships between educatio establishments/ youth organisations and/or other relevant actors.
- Large-scale partnerships between education and training establishments and business, in the form of Knowledge Alliances for higher education and Sector Skills Alliances.
- IT support platforms, including e-Twinning.
- Capacity building in third countries, with a strong focus on neighbourhood countries.

### Support for policy reform

- Support to open methods of coordination (ET 2020, EU youth strategy) and the European Semester (Europe 2020).
- EU tools: valorisation and implementation.
- Policy dialogue (stakeholders, third countries, international organisations).



- Sport Action (1%)










# Possible Yearly Funding Evolution 2014-2020 Compared to 2007-2013
